



Windsor Police Service 2019 Annual Report

DID YOU KNOW?

In the 152 year history of the Windsor Police Service, 2019 was an especially historic year that saw the initiation of policing services being provided to the Town of Amherstburg and Pamela Mizuno being named Chief of Police.



On January 1, 2019 the Windsor Police Service began policing the Town of Amherstburg after the signing of a 20 year contract. This marked the end of the Amherstburg Police Service and the approximately 30 members of that organization were officially sworn in as Windsor Police Service officers. Amherstburg operates as a detachment and separate statistics are maintained for it.

Pamela Mizuno joined the Windsor Police Service in 1994 and was named Superintendent in 2016. In 2018, she became a Deputy Chief. On October 4, 2019, Mizuno was officially named Chief of Police, becoming the first female in the Service's history to hold that rank.

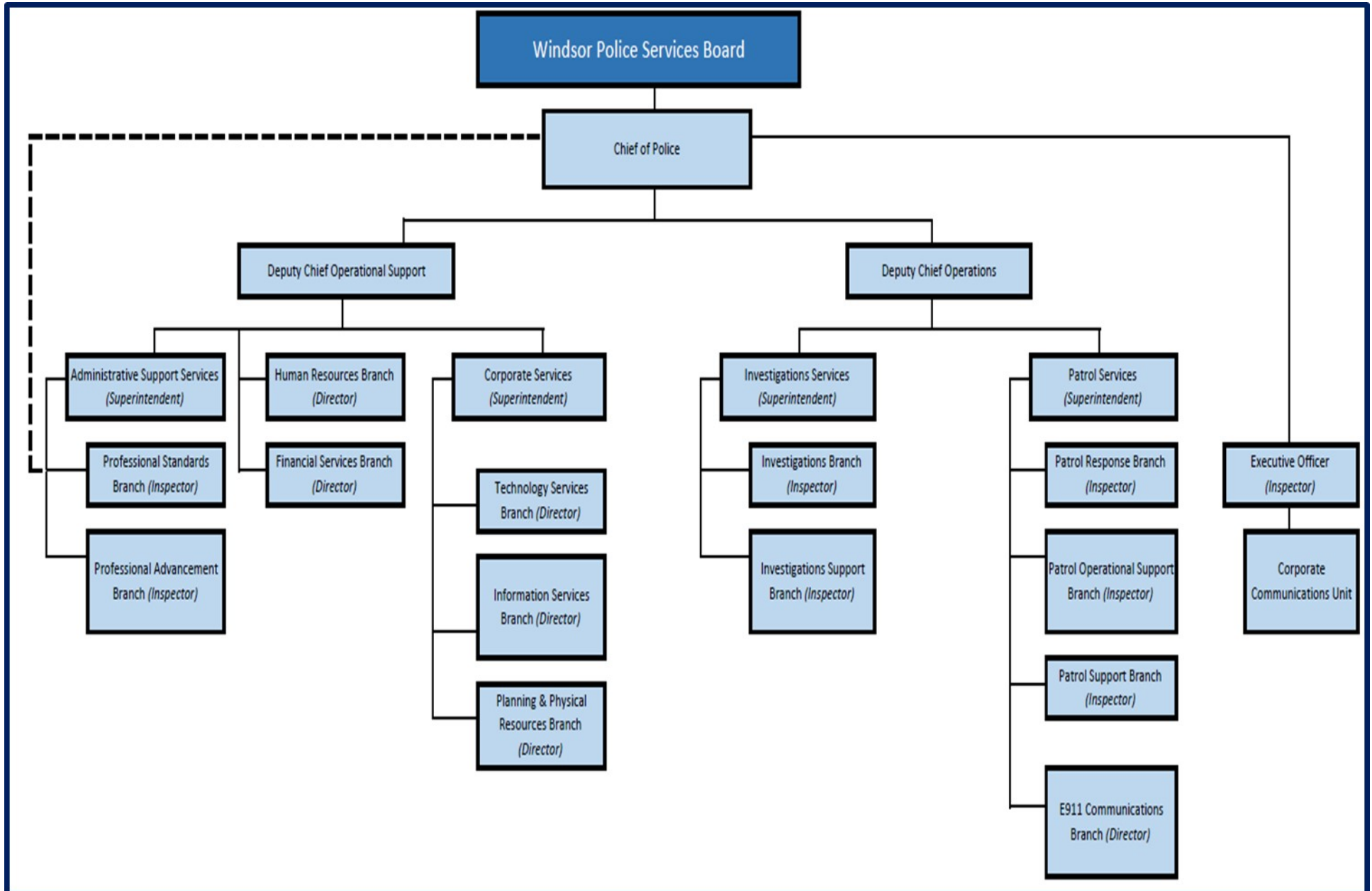

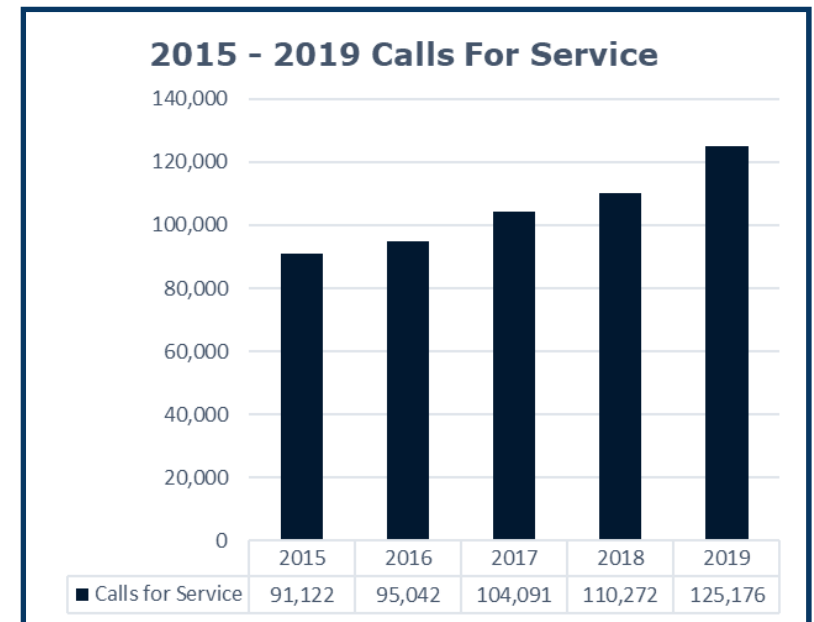
WPS Organizational Chart



PATROL RESPONSE

The Windsor Police Service is committed to providing effective, front-line policing to the citizens and visitors of our city. Our core functions include crime prevention, law enforcement, providing assistance to victims of crime, public order maintenance, and emergency response.

Patrol Response responded to 125,176 calls for service in 2019. This represented a 14% increase from 2018.

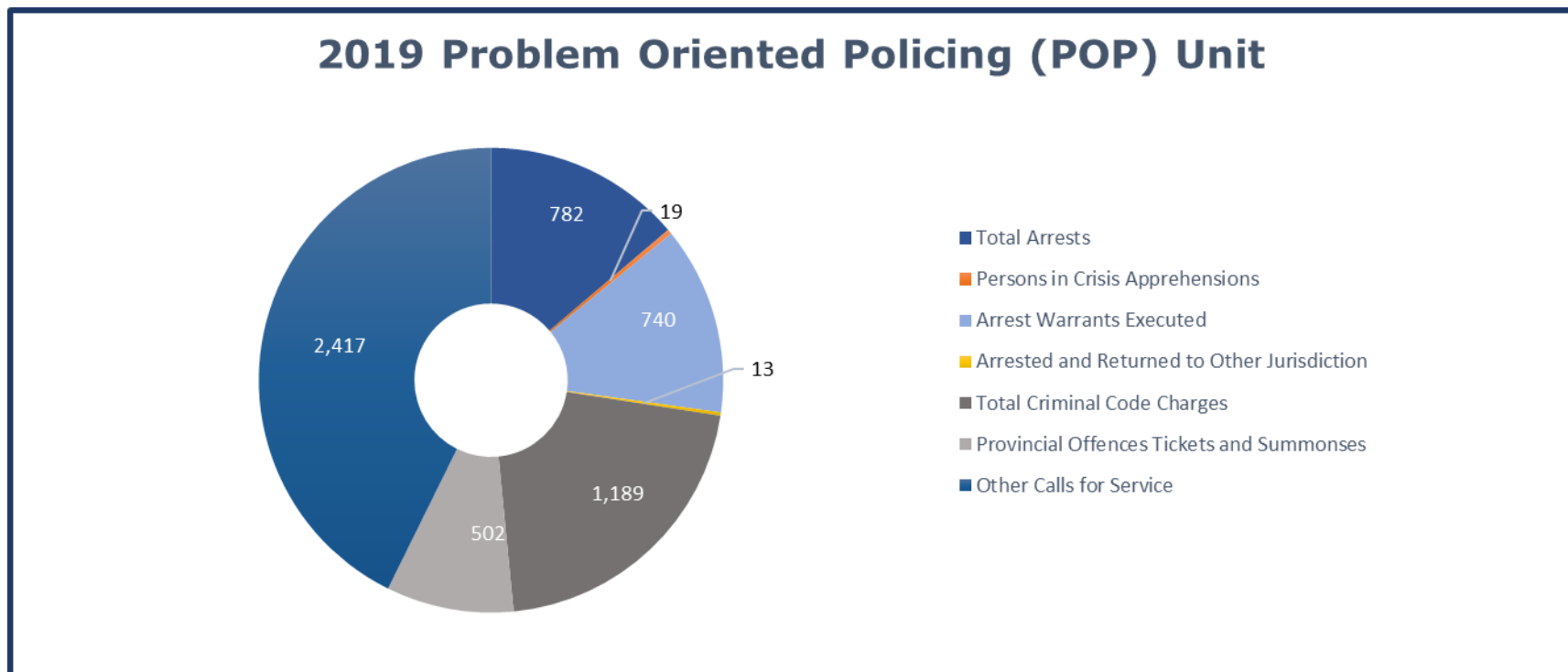


PROBLEM ORIENTED POLICING (POP) UNIT

The Problem Oriented Policing (POP) Unit was formed in October of 2018. The Unit emerged as a rapid response to community demands for increased enforcement in the downtown area. The POP Unit also patrols other areas of the city in response to enduring problems that require sustained police attention.

Resourced from the Patrol Division, the POP Unit initiated a strategy of high visibility and high enforcement as part of a broader scheme to improve quality of life for stakeholders in the downtown area.

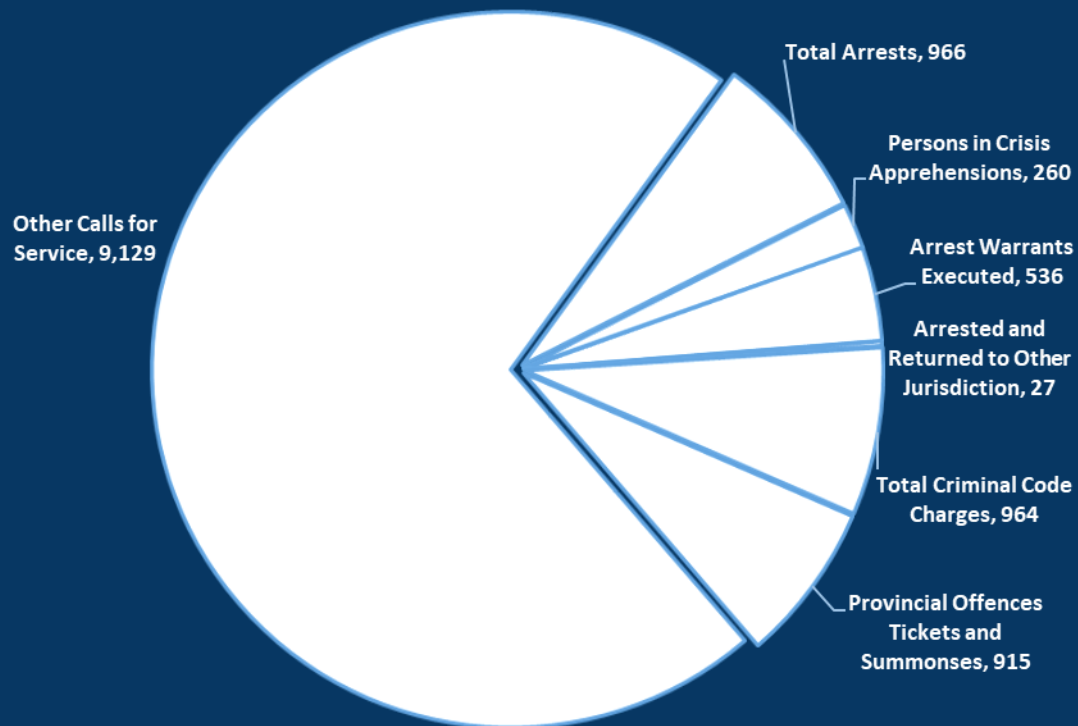
The POP Unit adopted a daily practice of interacting with community groups, schools, shelters, business owners and residents to ensure all concerns were represented and addressed. The POP Unit made progress in dealing with disorderly and criminal behaviour by individuals in the downtown area. Moreover, the POP Unit has been successful in locating many persons wanted on outstanding arrest warrants and criminal charges both locally and by outside jurisdictions. The POP Unit has also developed a reputation for working with community partners to connect individuals in need to appropriate support services.



CITY CENTRE PATROL (C.C.P.) UNIT

The CCP is comprised of twenty-one officers who work on foot, bike and in police vehicles, within the downtown area.

The designated CCP patrol zone was modified slightly in January of 2019, increasing the total geographical territory patrolled by this unit. One notable change in 2019, was the sight of CCP officers patrolling the interior area of Caesars Casino as part of their daily patrol activities. This is the first time that uniform officers from WPS have conducted such patrols since the inception of casino gaming in Windsor.



2019 marked a new path of collaboration with numerous community partners. Rather than focus solely on enforcement, CCP officers prioritized a strategy that seeks to connect individuals in need of support services to available support networks and resources in the community.

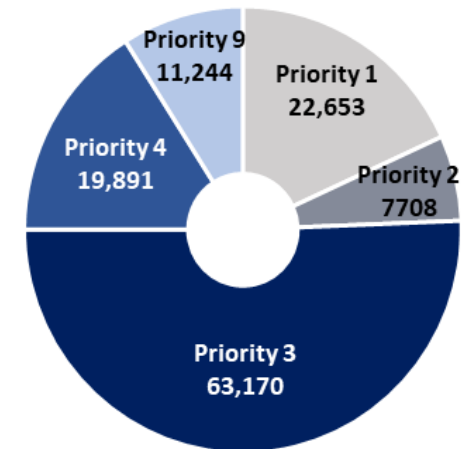
EMERGENCY 911 CENTRE

The mandate of the Windsor Police Service Emergency 911 Centre is to provide quick, efficient, quality service to those requiring emergency and non-emergency service.

BY PRIORITY

- **Priority 1** - *Emergency Response* - Life threatening situation
- **Priority 2** - *Urgent Response* - Event in progress that requires immediate police intervention
- **Priority 3** - *Routine Response* - Events that require police involvement but do not require urgent response
- **Priority 4** - *Regulatory Response* - Events requiring a police presence such as traffic escorts or follow-ups
- **Priority 9** - *Alternative Police Response* - Via telephone or Coplogic

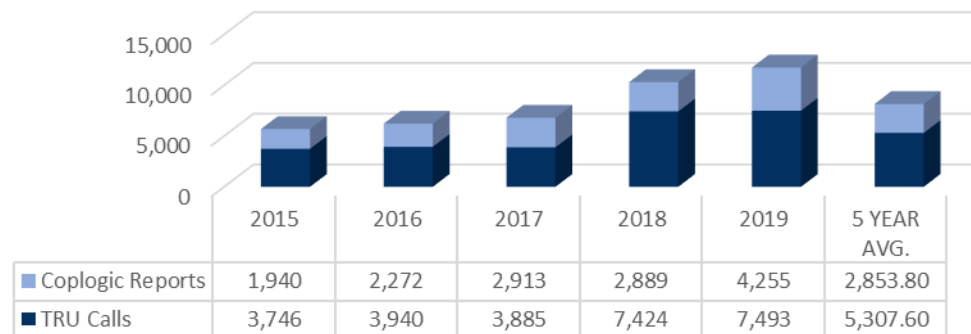
2019 Calls For Service



Telephone Response Unit (TRU) & Coplogic

Both TRU and Coplogic were designed to provide members of the community with an alternative method of reporting minor crimes in which there are no safety concerns. The property loss for these reports are relatively minor and the presence of a police officer on scene is neither mandatory nor will it advance an investigation.

AMHERSTBURG DETACHMENT

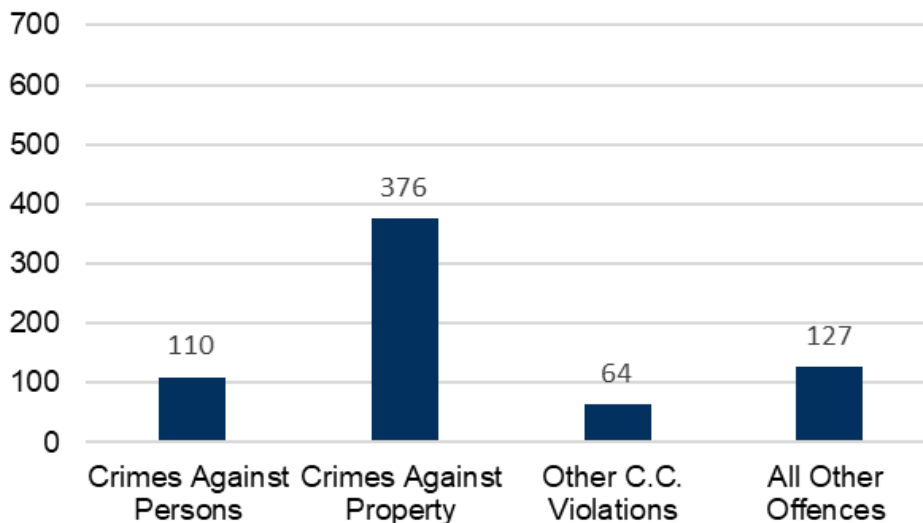


In January of 2019 the Windsor Police Service began policing the Town of Amherstburg. The Windsor Police Service - Amherstburg Detachment consists of thirty members assigned to different units of policing including Patrol Response, Traffic Enforcement, Criminal investigations and Community Outreach.

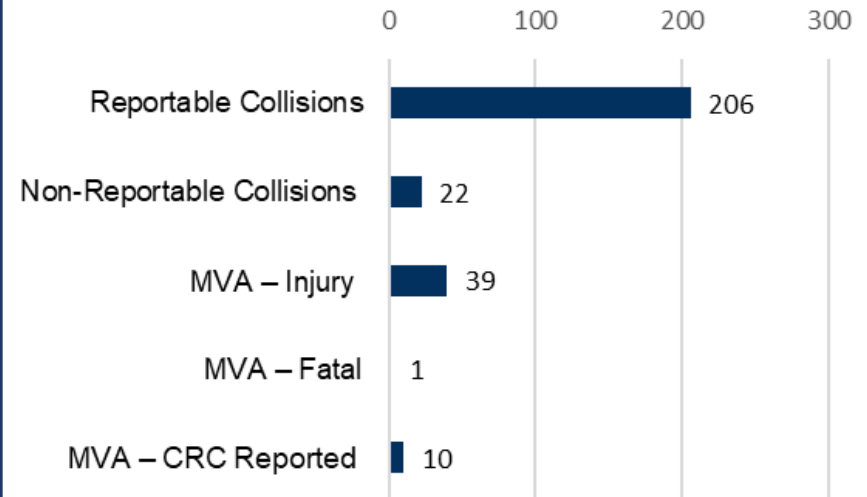
The Town of Amherstburg not only retained the level of policing to which they were accustomed, but also gained significant benefits in terms of specialized expertise and physical resources.

In 2019, The Amherstburg Detachment responded to 6,278 calls for service resulting in 1,683 reports and 193 arrests.

2019 Amherstburg MVA Investigations



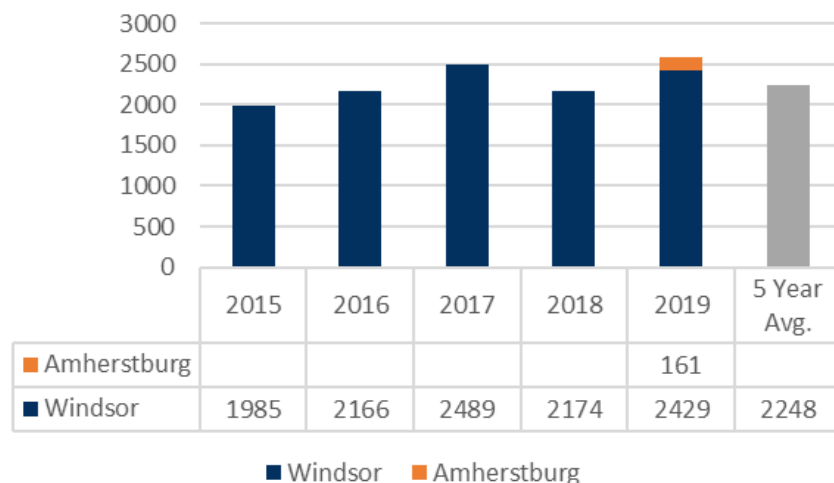
Community Outreach and Support Team (COAST)



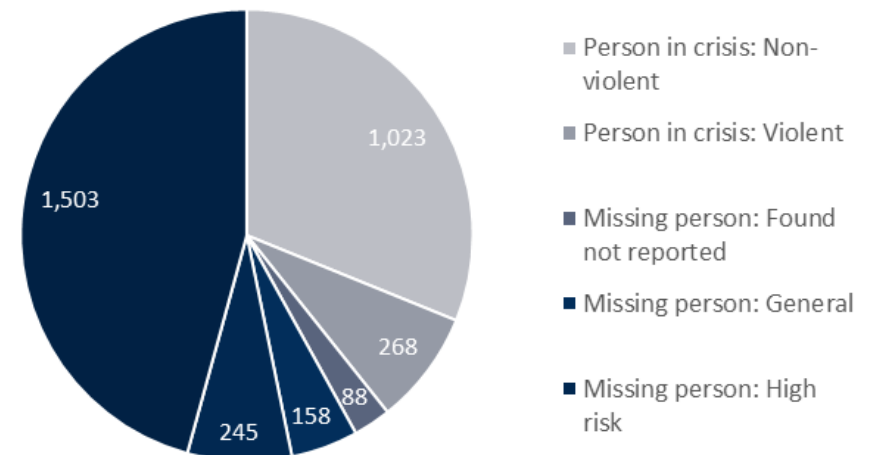
The Community Outreach and Support Team (COAST) is a partnership between the Windsor Police Service and the Community Crisis Centre of Hotel-Dieu Grace Healthcare. The team consists of two police officers and two crisis workers who provide on-site crisis and mental health assessments to individuals residing in the community. They also help to facilitate access to community services and supports in order to divert persons from the criminal justice system and/or hospital emergency departments. COAST is not an emergency response service.

COAST accepts referrals from the police, community service providers, family members and citizens.

2015 - 2019 Mental Health Related Calls for Service

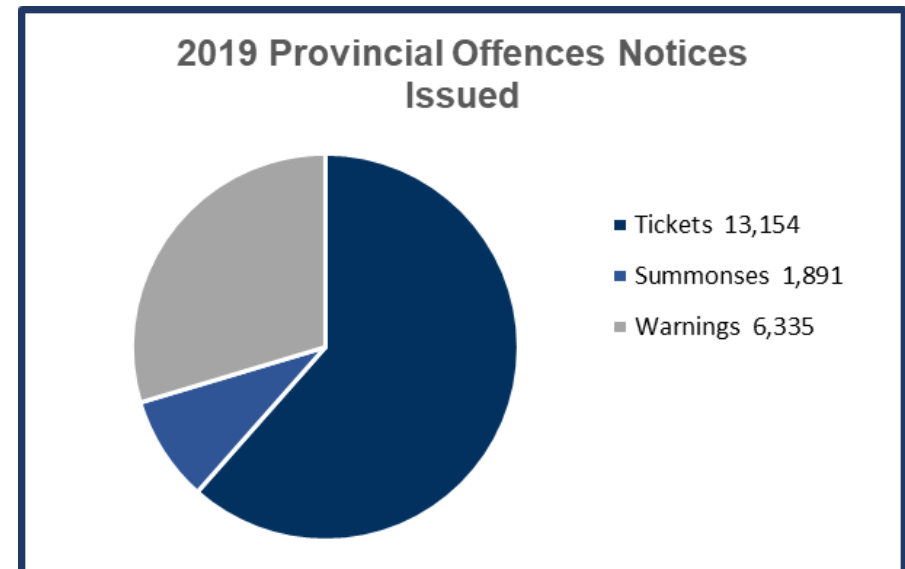
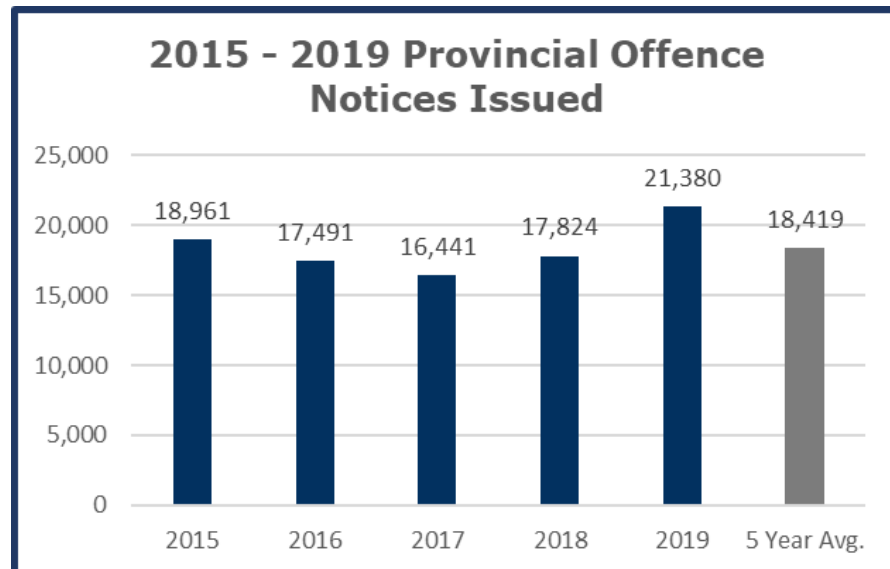
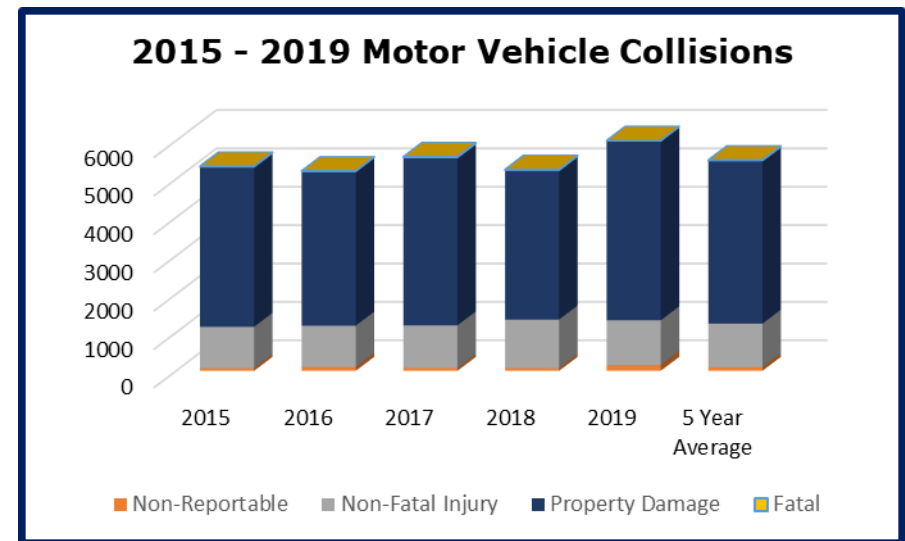
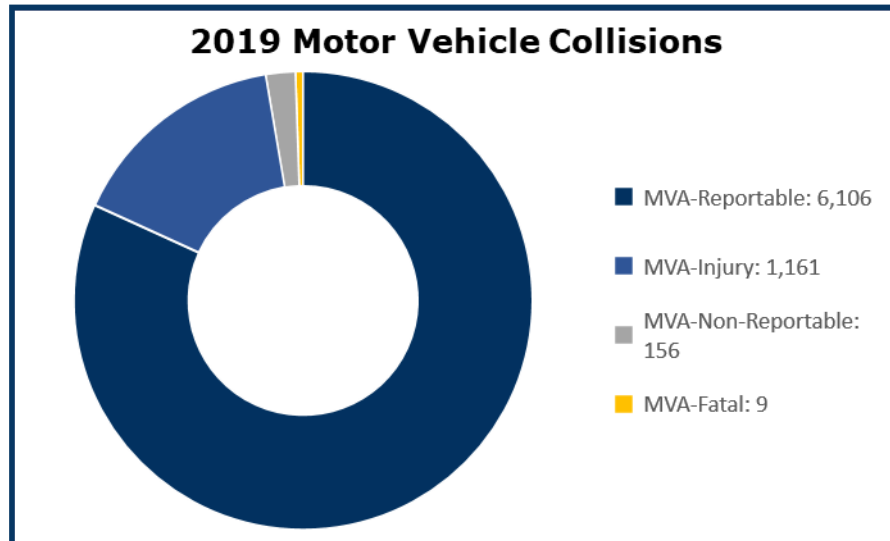


2019 Mental Health Calls for Service



Motor Vehicle Collisions (MVA) and Provincial Offences Notices (Tickets)

In 2019, the Windsor Police Service investigated 6,106 motor vehicle collisions compared to 5,246 in 2018, representing a 15% increase. 3,602 collisions were referred to the Collision Reporting Center.

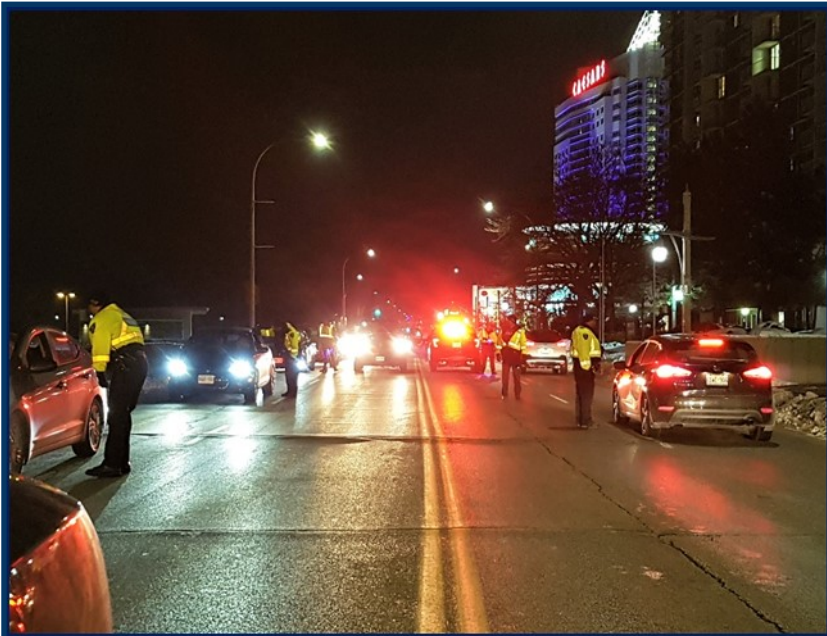
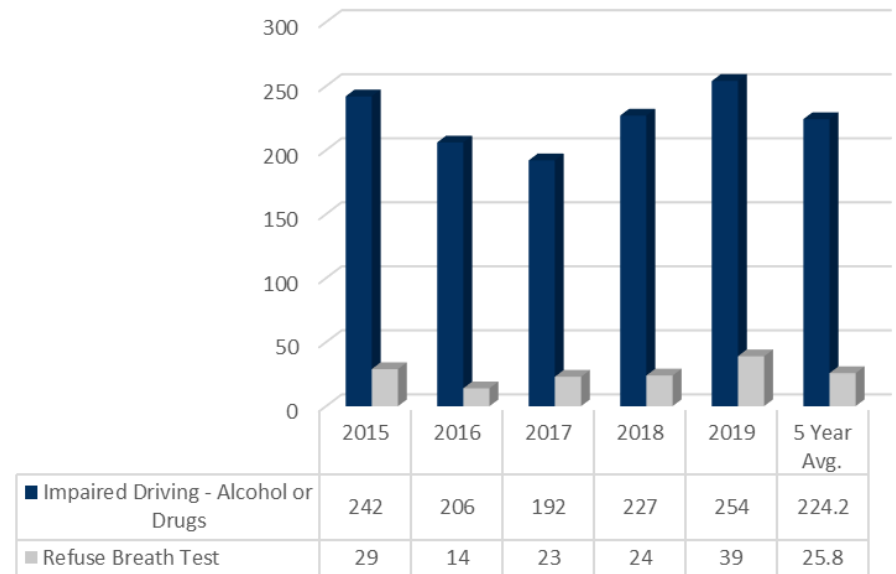


Impaired Driving Enforcement

The Traffic Enforcement Branch's main goal is to ensure the orderly and safe movement of traffic in the City of Windsor, and Town of Amherstburg. The Traffic Enforcement Branch was involved in Standard Field Sobriety Testing (SFST), and Drug Recognition Evaluation (DRE) training. This training was put into field use throughout 2019.

As part of the Windsor Police Service's continued commitment to Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), and their initiatives, 15 Reduce Drunk Driving Everywhere (RIDE) Programs were deployed in conjunction with other law enforcement partners, including the Ministry of Transportation.

REMOTELY PILOTED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM (RPAS)

In September 2019, the Windsor Police Service established a Remotely Piloted Aircraft System (RPAS). The RPAS unit is comprised of six members.

All members of the Unit have successfully obtained their advanced operations certification and Special Flight Operator Certificate from Transport Canada. Members of the RPAS Unit are resourced from other units within the police service and are made available as needed.

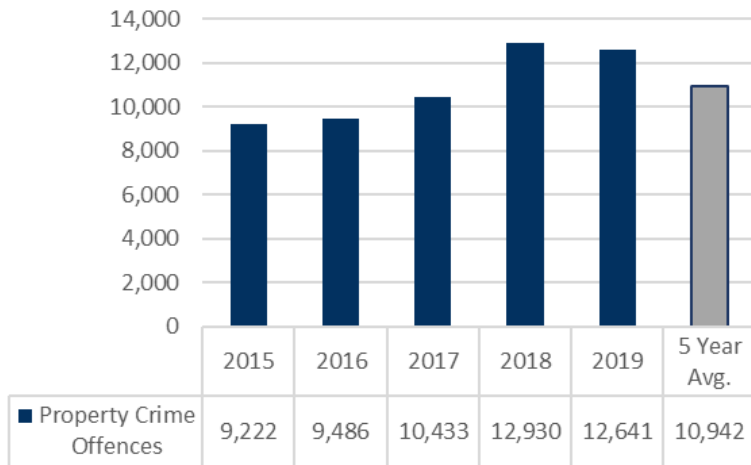
Examples of situations in which RPAS may be deployed include:

- Event monitoring

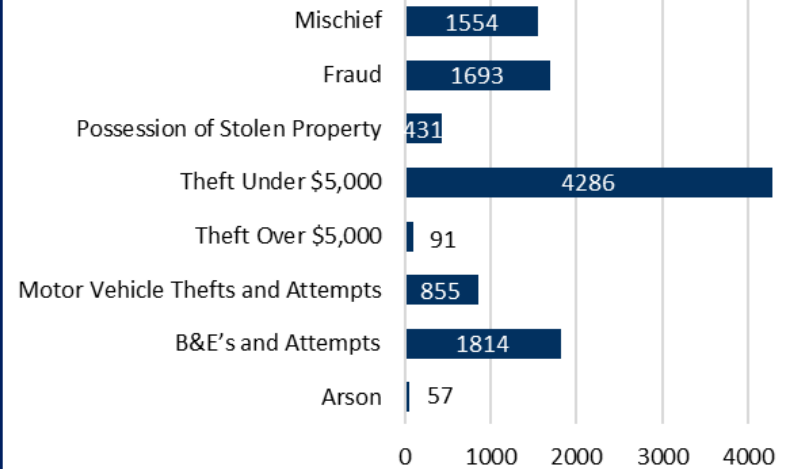


INVESTIGATION SERVICES - Property Crime Offences/Criminal Code Occurrences

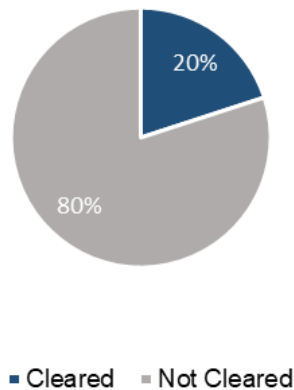
2015-2019 Property Crime Offences



2019 Property Crimes



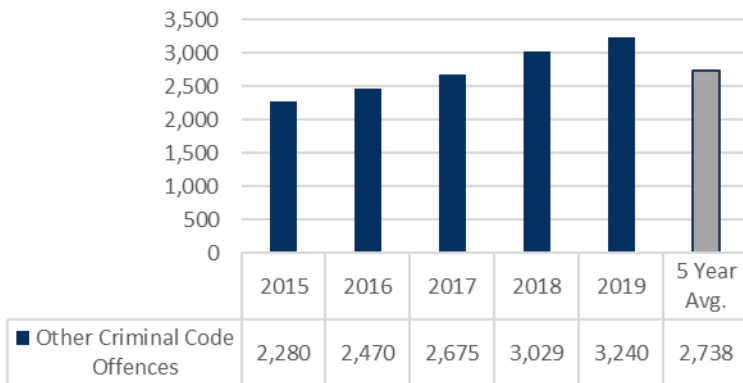
2019 Clearance Rate Property Crime



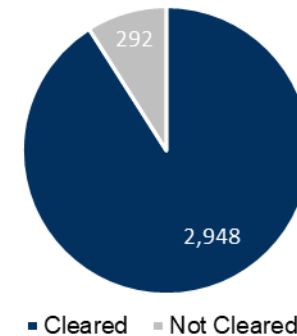
Other Criminal Code Definition

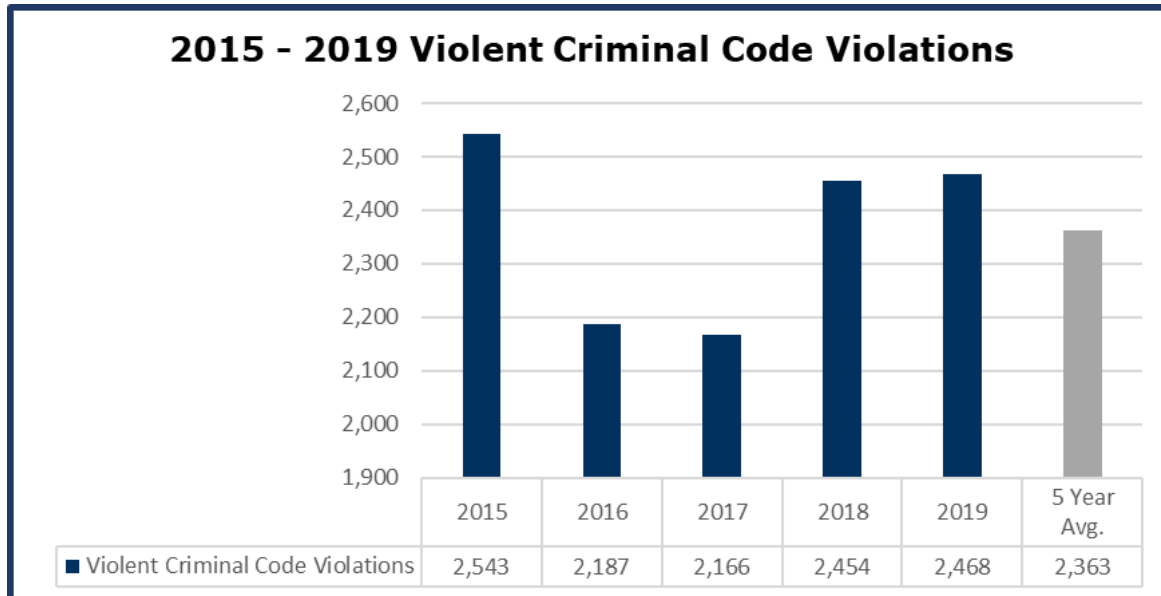
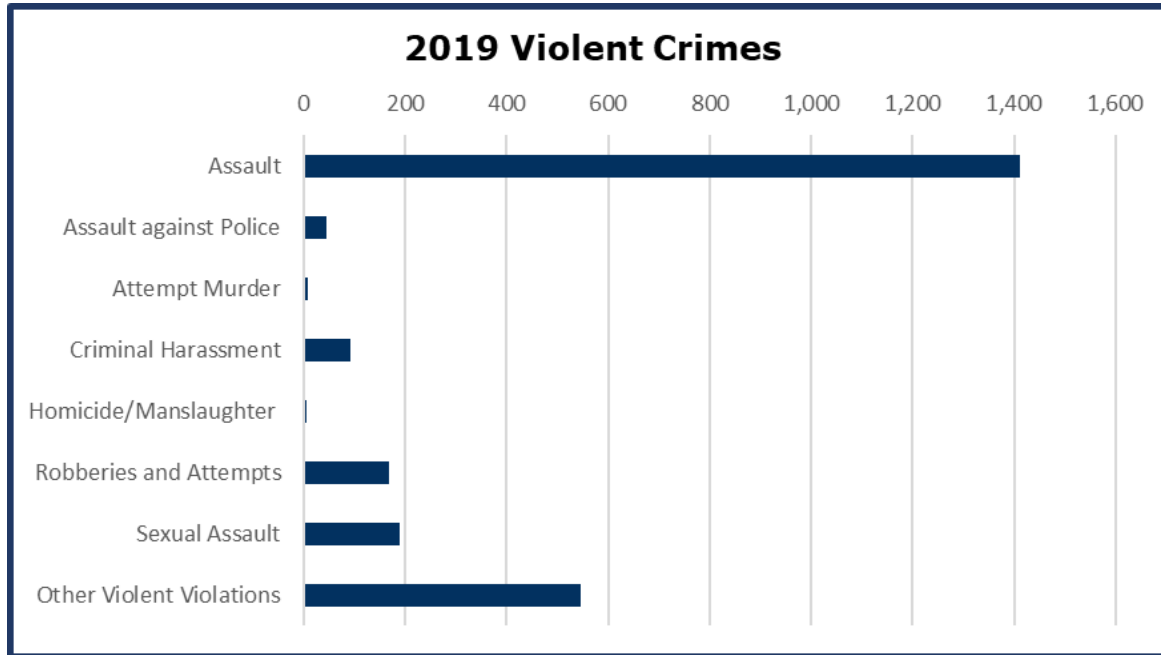

SUDDEN DEATH

The Windsor Police Service attends and investigates all sudden deaths that result from homicide, suicide, accident, unexplained, unknown or apparent natural causes under circumstances that require the notification of a coroner or police officer pursuant to the Coroners Act.

In 2019, 294 deaths were investigated.

INVESTIGATION SERVICES HIGHLIGHT: Ljubica TOPIC Homicide (Cold Case)

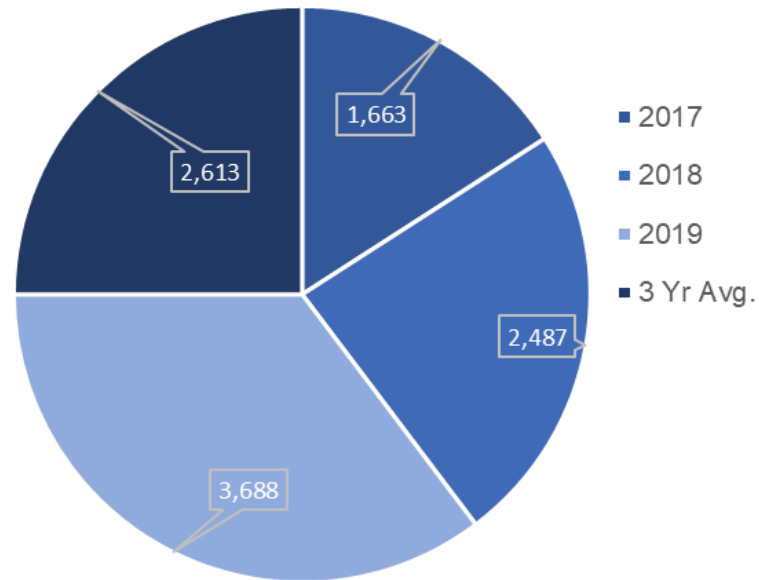
On May 14, 1971, Ljubica TOPIC (6 years old) was abducted in the 1200 block of Drouillard Rd. Her abductor was identified by witnesses as a male, and was last observed walking south on Drouillard Rd, holding her hand. Ljubica's body was discovered close to her home, shortly after she went missing.

This investigation spanned decades and involved many investigators. Thanks to the diligence and foresight of investigating officers at the time, seized evidence in the form of DNA helped identify a profile of the suspected murderer.

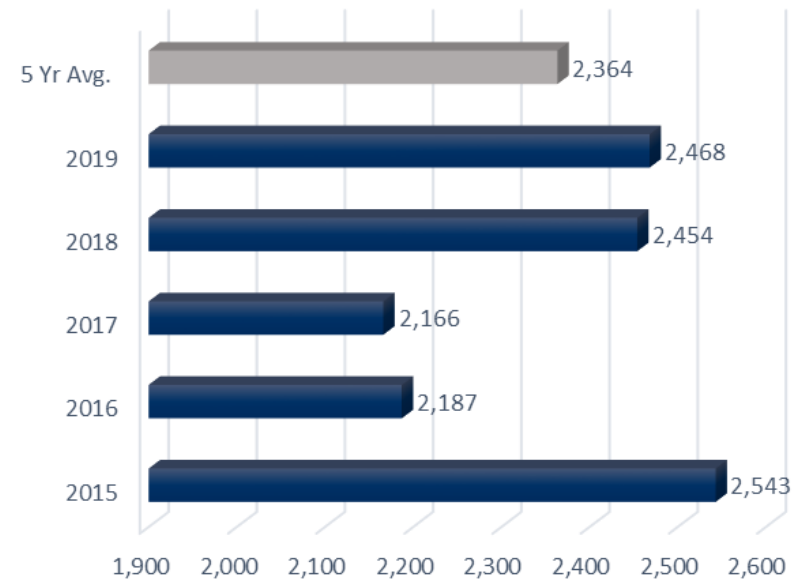
In 2019, using current investigative techniques, Windsor Police investigators were able to close a 48 year old homicide investigation.



2017 - 2019 Victim Services: Contacts by Cases



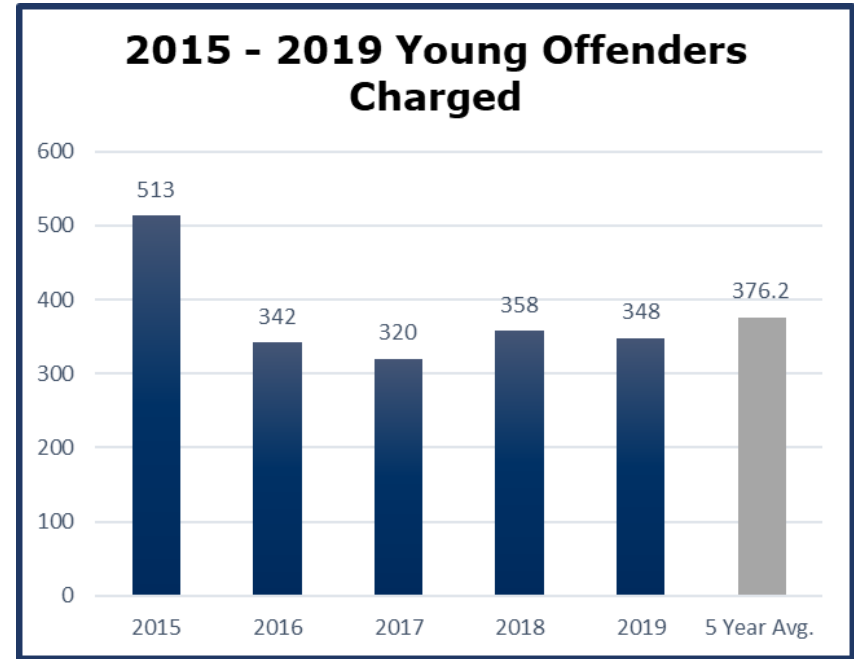
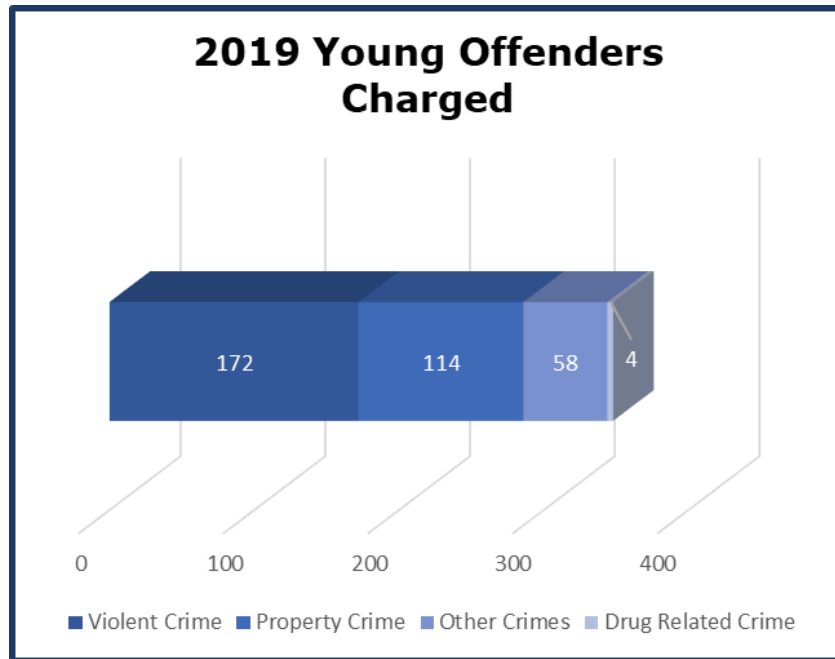
2015 - 2019 Victims of Violent Crimes



Did You Know?

September 30, 2019, saw the termination of the Criminal Injuries Compensation Board (CICB) within the province of Ontario. CICB has awarded financial assistance to victims of crime since 1971. The Victim Quick Response Program (VQRP), introduced in 2007, was re-introduced after the termination of CICB as the Victim Quick Response Program (VQRP+). This enhanced program seeks to reduce instances where victims potentially relive their trauma and operates locally through Victim Services of Windsor-Essex County. VQRP+ assists victims, their immediate family members and witnesses in the aftermath of a violent crime.

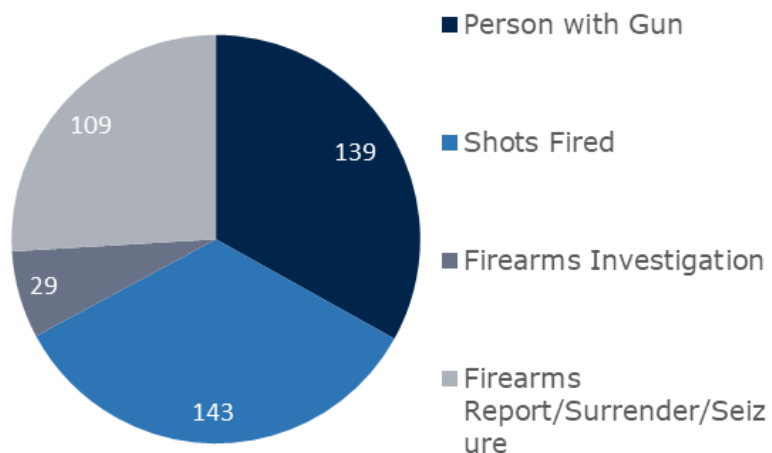
In 2019, the Windsor Police Service Detention Centre handled 10,573 prisoners. This total includes the 4,596 prisoners brought in from Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Service facilities for court appearances.

INVESTIGATIVE SUPPORT – Drug and Gun Enforcement

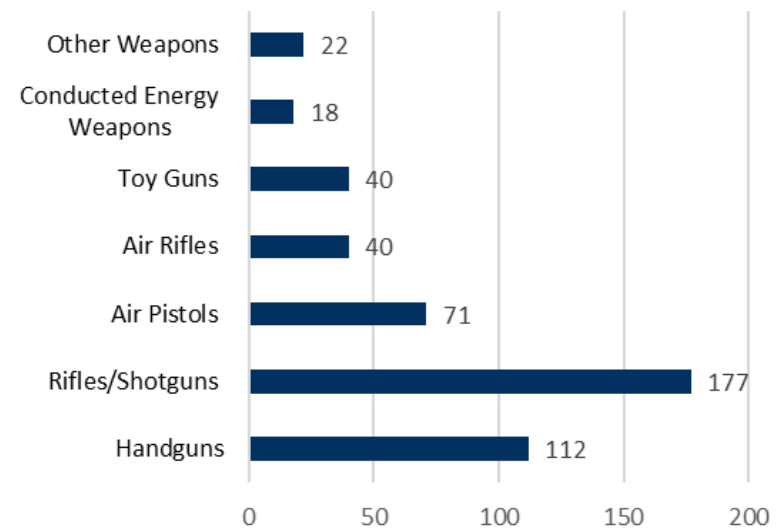
The Drugs and Guns Enforcement Unit (DGEU) investigates and enforces offences that relate to the possession, trafficking and importation of illicit narcotics contrary to the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act (CDSA). DGEU enforces the Criminal Code (CC) in relation to firearm offences. The Provincial Cannabis Enforcement Team (PCET) enforces the illegal distribution, cultivation and possession of cannabis contrary to the Federal Cannabis Act.



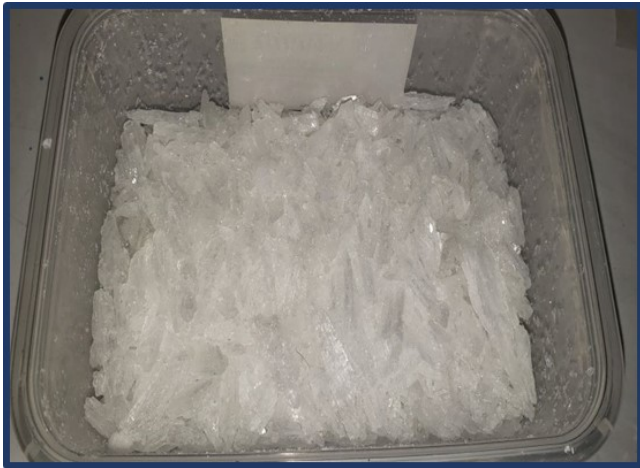
2019 Firearms Calls for Service by Type

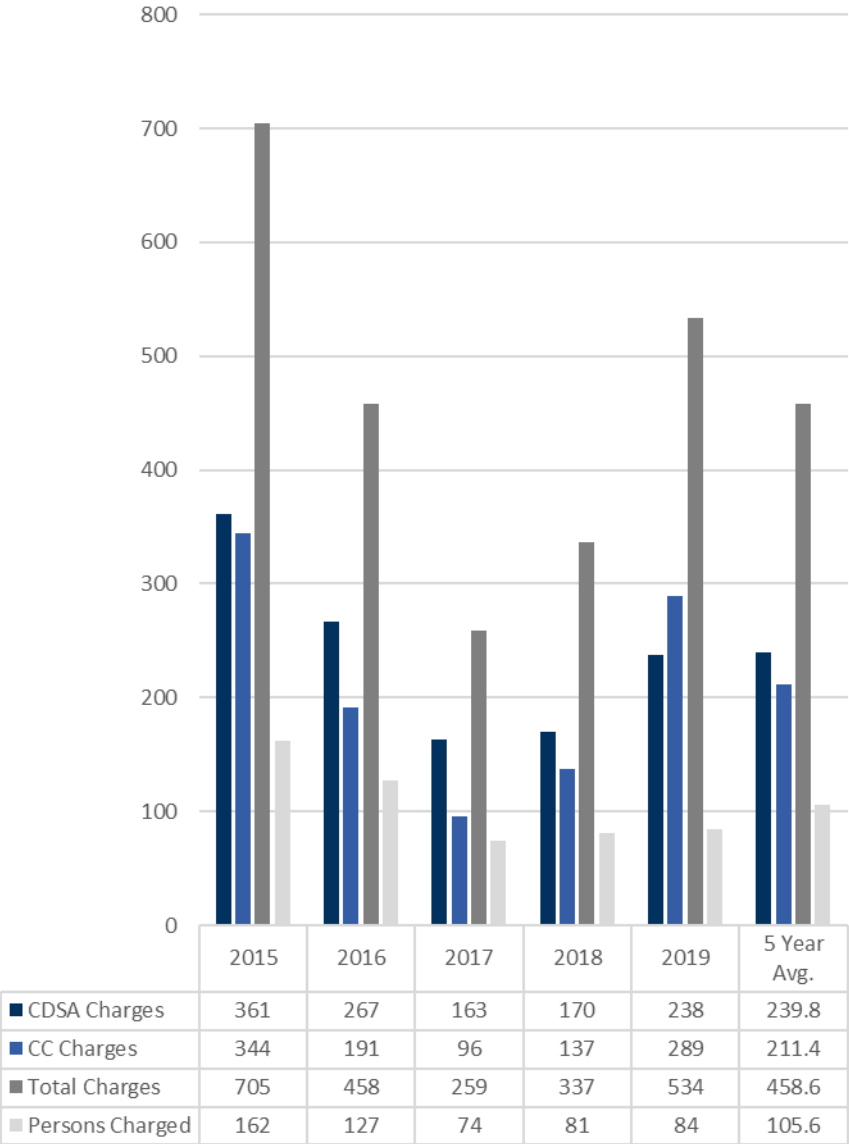

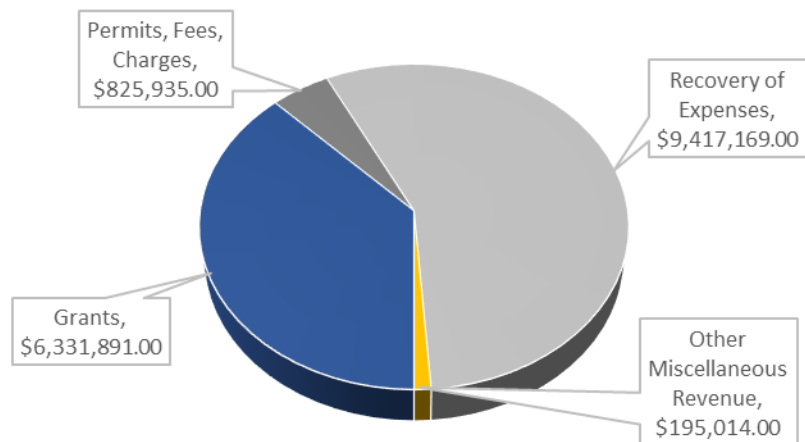

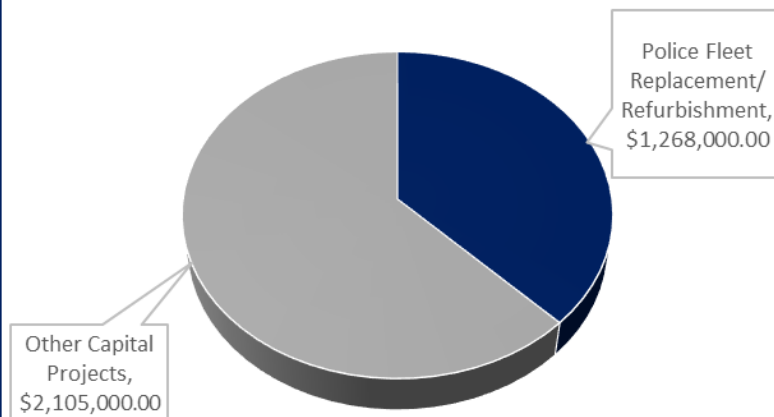

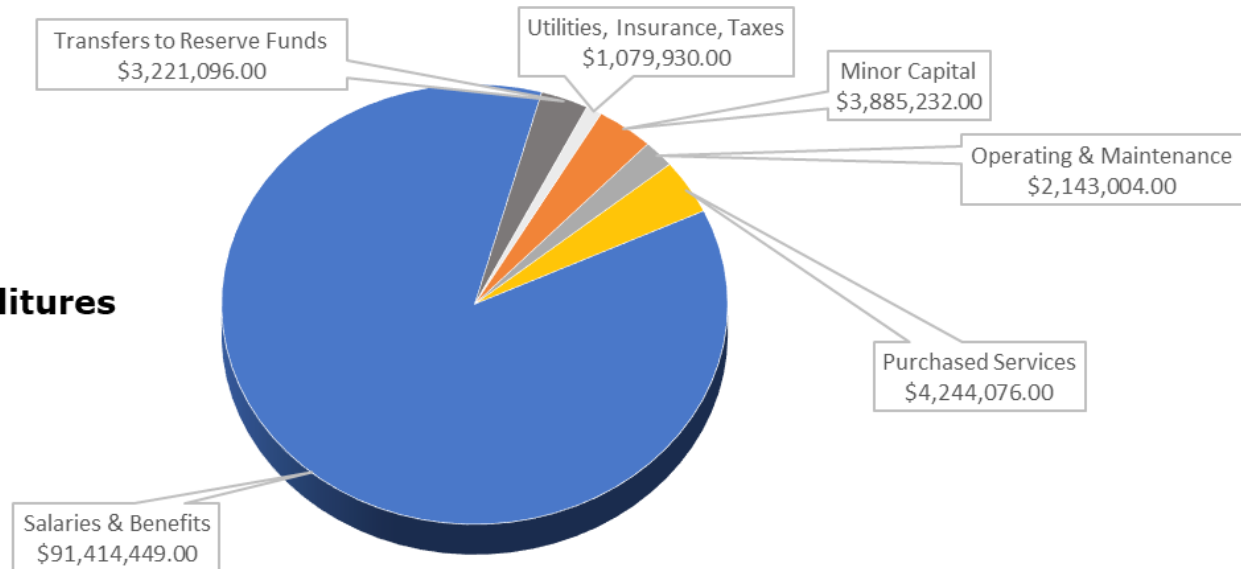
2019 Actual Revenues

2019 Actual Expenditures

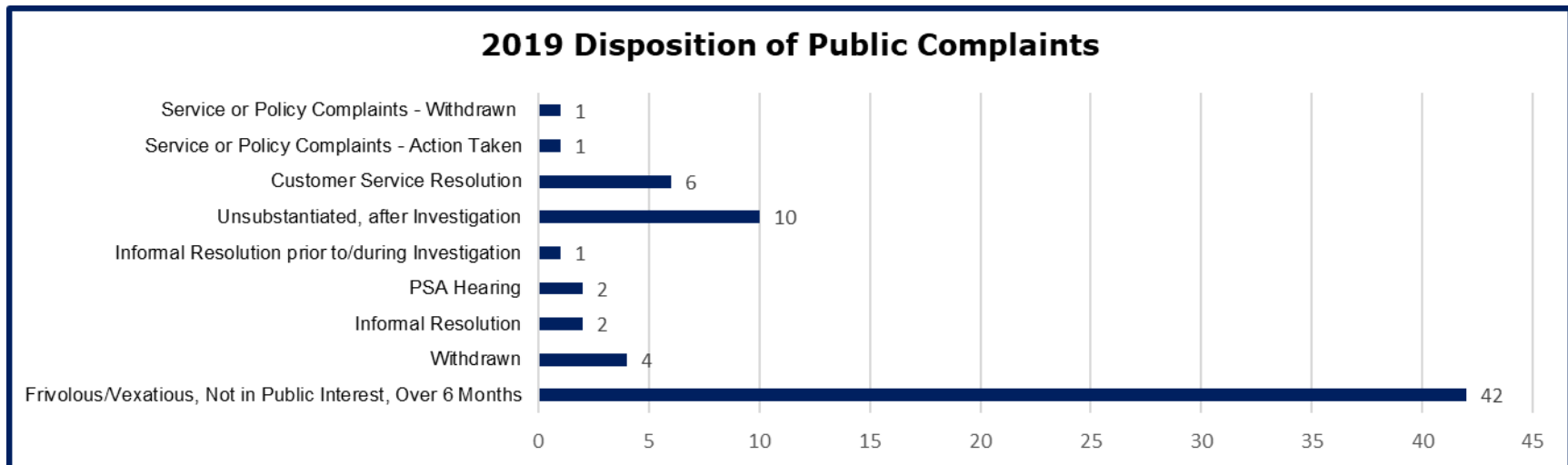
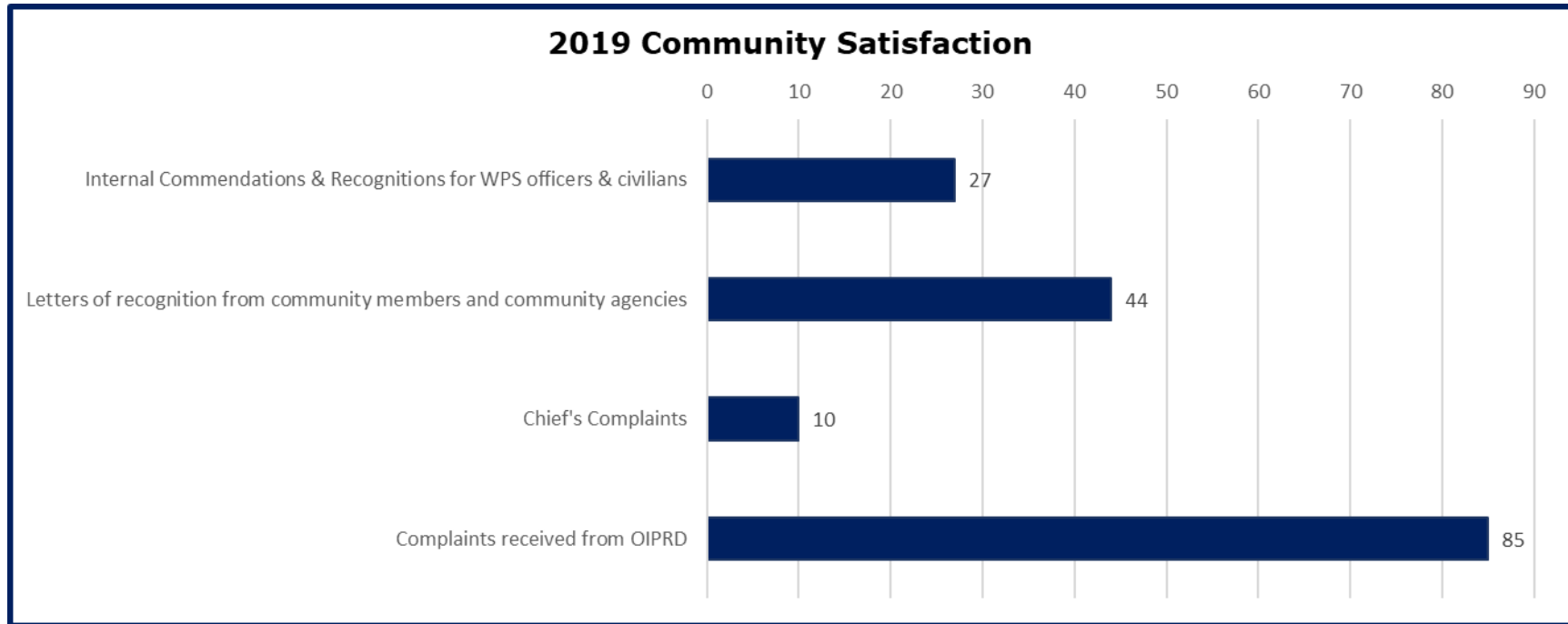
